
## PRINCIPALS MESSAGE

Snow closures and power outages are an annual occurrence in Langley School District. So, where do you go to get information about the status of schools during periods of inclement weather? If you don't have internet connectivity but your phone is working, call a relative or friend in an area that has not been affected by the storm and ask them to check the district website for you. Please note that Langley District schools are all considered 'open' until a decision to close is required. Decisions on school closures are usually made by 6:30am. As always, it is a parent's decision whether to send their child to school based on safety and individual circumstances. If you feel it is unsafe for you or your child to travel to or attend an open school for any reason, please keep your child home and report an absence to the school.



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
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## West Fine Art Show

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## Mask Guidelines Update—March 31st 2021



March 31, 2021

Dear Parents/Guardians, Students and Staff:

Re: Mask Guidelines Update

In follow up to yesterday's Information Bulletin, the District is sharing an update on guidelines regarding mask wearing in schools. The Ministry of Education, Provincial Health Office, and BC Centre for Disease Control have provided school districts with amendments to the K-12 health and safety guidelines which are found in these two documents:

BCCDC Public Health Guidance for K-12 Schools

Provincial COVID-19 Health and Safety Guidelines for K-12 Settings

#### Here's What You Need To Know

Effective immediately all K-12 staff, students in Grades 4 to 12, and visitors to schools will be required to wear non-medical masks in all indoor areas, including when they are at their workstations (desks), and on school buses - both within and outside of their learning group.

#### Exceptions include:

- A person who is unable to wear a mask because they do not tolerate it (for health or behavioural reasons)
- A person unable to put on or remove a mask without the assistance of another person
- If the mask is removed temporarily for the purposes of identifying the person wearing it
- If the mask is removed temporarily to engage in an educational activity that cannot be performed while wearing a mask (e.g. actively playing a wind instrument, high-intensity physical activity, etc.)
- If a person is eating or drinking
- If a person is behind a barrier
- While providing a service to a person with a disability or diverse ability (including but not limited to a hearing impairment), where visual cues, facial expressions and/or lip reading/movements are important

Students in Kindergarten to Grade 3 are strongly encouraged to wear a mask indoors in schools and on school buses – both within and outside of their learning group – though mask wearing ultimately remains a personal or family/caregiver choice for these students, and their choices must be respected.

Students will be able to remove their masks while outside, including at recess, lunchtime and while learning outside. As weather improves, teachers will continue to look for opportunities to move their classes outside.

#### Here Is What You Need To Know To Help Your Child

- · Please send your child with a clean mask and a spare mask to school daily
- Schools are able to provide students a cloth mask or disposable mask if they forget but it is not intended to be daily in frequency
- Watch this Health Canada <u>video</u> with your child or view this <u>poster</u> for guidance on mask wearing

#### Moving Forward

Our administrators, teachers and school-based staff will spend this week helping students get comfortable and adapt to these new guidelines. The District will continue to work with the Ministry of Education and public health and will provide the community with updates to health and safety changes as they become available.

As we continue to adapt to these challenging circumstances, we appreciate everyone's efforts to work together and follow health and safety guidelines. These measures are intended to keep all of us as safe as possible during these difficult times. Thank you for your ongoing patience and support in this evolving situation.

## New Daily Health Check Form – Digital and Print Version

Thank you for continuing to conduct a daily health check with your child. It is an important measure to help keep our school community healthy and safe. 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## **Enhanced Safety Measures for K-12 Schools**

The District appreciates all the hard work from students, staff, and families in helping keep our community safe. We continue to work closely with the Ministry of Education and Provincial Health Office. This week the province announced changes to COVID-19 health and safety guidelines for schools. Mask requirements for middle and secondary school students and K-12 staff have been amended. Guidelines have also been strengthened for physical education and music classes.

It is important to note, our schools will need some time to implement these new changes; all changes will be in effect as of February 26, 2021. Your continued patience and support are appreciated. If you have any questions, please contact the school.

Please read below and full details found in the province's news release located on the District website here.

### **Changes to Mask Wearing**

All middle and secondary students and K-12 staff will now be required to wear non-medical masks in all indoor areas, including when they are with their learning groups. The only exceptions are when:

- sitting or standing at their seat or workstation in a classroom;
- there is a barrier in place; or
- they are eating or drinking.

For elementary students, wearing masks indoors remain a personal choice.

It is important to note, as advised by the province, these changes above do not apply to grade 6 and 7 students attending an elementary school.

#### Changes to Physical Education and Music Classes

High-intensity physical activities are to be held outside as much as possible. Shared equipment or items, such as weight machines, treadmills or musical instruments, can be used only if they are cleaned between use, according to strict school sanitization guidelines. Students using equipment or playing instruments should also be spaced at least two metres apart and masks are to be used when singing.

#### COVID-19 and Youth Mental Health

Since COVID-19 was declared a pandemic, many public health responses have been implemented including social distancing measures and school closures.

These measures may have an impact on the mental health of children and teens, and we need to adjust the type and amount of resources being offered our children.

The MyHEARTSMAP team needs your help to measure how much and in what ways the changes in our lives during the pandemic have affected the social and psychological wellness of our children and youth.

Using the MyHEARTSMAP online psychosocial self-screening tool, children, youth, and (or) their parents, can learn about which aspects of their mental health may be of concern and might benefit from support resources, and where to find them in BC.

Learning about our children's needs will help guide our provincial mental health resource planning.



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
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## **Career Exploration Conversations**

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



Each artist is featured and the range of styles move from engrossing renditions of Vancouver streets of the 1960s, proferred with smack-on-the-ground attention to detail, to illuminating episodes of Canadians' obsession with hockey, as only a former Canuck player can so whimsically render. And as you comfortably move throughout the online displays, you come across the splendour of a birch forest, the gentle solace of a west-coast landscape, and the breath-taking colour of dazzling realism. And that's not all. Award-winning sculpted metal and stone works beckon every eye telling powerful stories of our natural surroundings. Hazy paintings strike undefined emotions or conjure up crazy feelings of angst. Colours explode, shapes skew themselves into blazing configurations and characters float in virtual space. This is an online gallery, not to be missed.

#### **Spotlight on Birds of Bronze**

In the works of Brent Cooke, every area of focus, from the dramatic swoops of a heron's neck to the delicate lines of a hummingbird's beak, you can't help but find inspiration in the subtleties and mysteries of the natural world. It is in Cooke's works that you appreciate the method in the making of things and in the ultimate joy of seeing them at fruition. From conception to creation and onwards to completion, the journey is long, but filled with passion, industry, foresight, planning and exuberance, not only for the viewer, but most importantly for the artist. For without the artist's passion, brains and brawn there can be no work of art. It takes guts and perseverance to make things happen.

As Brent Cooke said to me, "The worst part of the process is when the inspiration dissolves into drudgery. That is when I start to procrastinate. I walk by the half-finished blob sitting in my studio and I have to force myself to go through the next steps — never quite sure if my vision will sustain the transfer from ethereal idea to tangible product. But, I've never been disappointed," he says with a palpable sigh mixed with a charming hint of disbelief.

#### From Concept to Completion

Brent Cooke starts with a vision. There is no drawing.

"I would be the worst person on your team in a game of Pictionary," says Cooke.

From his vision, he creates an armature (metal structure) of his subject and after a six-month long process (once started, there is no room for mistake) of filling with wax, sculpting with clay, firing and exposing his creation to a 1000 degree furnace, he has his bronze statue. Elegant in itself. But the work is far from complete. Next comes the alchemy of patina as the bronze-made alloy slowly metamorphizes into a startling replica of life. Colours, filigree, shading and nuance are added with extreme and sweaty precision – any tiny misstep could spell disaster.

"I would have to start all over again – from square one and right through that agonizing procrastination period," says Cooke with a hearty laugh. "Luckily it has never happened." I couldn't help but empathize. Well done Mr. Cooke! Your art is awesome.

#### **Spotlight on Richard Brodeur**

#### **Double Talent: The merging of ice and art**

Say the name Richard Brodeur and what comes to mind? Some say NHL goalie, others say artist. Richard Brodeur, in a charming French-Canadian accent says, "I am not one without the other."

#### The Years on the Ice

Born in 1952, Brodeur grew up in Longueuil, Quebec. Situated along the St. Lawrence River, the town was lined with quaint peak-roofed homes all overflowing with dozens of frolicsome children. Included among the throng was Richard Brodeur, the third oldest in a family of six boys and two girls.

"In the summer we swam in the St. Lawrence River and in winter we skated along her rough surface," said Brodeur with an air of pride. And in Longueuil, hockey culture dominated. "If you could skate and outperform your friends, you were on your way to a career in the NHL", said a chuckling Brodeur. "At least that was the dream."

Of course, only a very few made the grade and Brodeur with his tenacity, grit and skill found himself skating around and around in a dangerous arena amongst athletes with super-human abilities. At only 5'7 and barely 160 pounds, Brodeur was at the mercy of a phalanx of huge foes on skates. He made his mark, but it came at a price. After ten stellar years in the WHA and NHL, including memorable stints with the New York Islanders and Vancouver Canucks, (remember King Richard in 1982), the relentless bashings on the guy from Quebec eventually took their toll.

#### **Art is Inseparable from Childhood Recollections**

"Even when I was on the bus to a game, I was sketching," said Brodeur. "My teammates would only scoff – at least that was what I feared. It was my secret. And when my career ended and my brain was a little scrambled, I turned to art. It was my salvation."

While Brodeur's arresting paintings reflect his dreamy remembrances, the festive look of these richly rendered canvases belie the difficulties he faced while producing them.

As a way to quell the vagaries of depression brought on by concussions, Brodeur hunkered back to the soothing memories of childhood, and in so doing produced a winning passel of works. Emerging as brilliant icons of Brodeur style, his paintings, skillfully articulated are both lyrical and active in their compositions. Featuring colourfully-dressed youngsters blithely skating on home-made ice rinks against back drops of charming village homes, red barns or acres of frozen fields, the paintings are like alluring invitations into a wistful past. The winter light of day or a full moon's oneiric glow of night occupy the extreme foreground, providing subtle illumination, enough to witness the shenanigans of children as they revel in the joy of hockey. Exciting the eye and lingering in the mind, the images rendered in oil, acrylic or water colour are

impressionistic swaths of gentle movement conjuring up an aching nostalgia for days gone by. The depth of visceral enjoyment explains their hypnotizing popularity and world-wide demand. Richard Brodeur is an artist that has an international audience.
